SRPN President's Report

Happy New Year everyone!

I'd like to start by thanking our two departing Trustees, Joan Thompson, and Mario Pisano. We've tackled some big issues over the last two years, and it has been a pleasure working with them.

I would also like to welcome our two new Trustees, Theresa Conte, and Linda Pisano. This is going to be a busy year for the Board, and I know by working together we can continue to move forward. I would also like to congratulate Judy Pakay and Gary Klaw for being re-elected. I look forward to continuing working with them.

As of the date I wrote this report, Senate Bill 2537, and its companion 4106 are still in committee. As you're aware, these Bills would allow the resale of homes in age-restricted communities without restrictions on the age of the buyer. We will continue to keep an eye on all legislation that can affect our community.

This is usually the time of year when people start planning Spring projects. We've had some residents come in for Architectural Requests after Berkeley Township refused to issue a permit for their project, due to the residents not submitting a Request to the SRPN-HOA with their permit application.

We've also had resident's complete projects without an Architectural Request OR permits from the Township. Berkeley Township has begun looking for violations, which could lead to a fine. When a resident comes to the HOA for approval to avoid a fine, and it is something that isn't allowed, it must be brought into Compliance before an Architectural Request can be approved, or in the worst case, removed. This is not a situation the HOA wants, or likes to be put in.

You must get an approved Architectural Request before Berkeley Township will issue a permit. It isn't a long process, and it can save us all headaches down the road.

As always, you can call the HOA Office during normal business hours if you have any questions, and if you leave a message, we will get back to you in a timely manner.



Just a Note

I've loved doing arts and crafts ever since I was a kid. It all started with a children's television show back in the 1950's. My sister Lynda and I (Eddie was just a toddler) would often sit in front of the television to watch Learn to Draw with John Gnagy (predecessor to Bob Ross). Once a week, for 15 minutes, he would magically transform his blank sketch pad into a wonderful life-like picture. Step by step, he drew straight lines, wavey lines, circles, and shadows - the whole time, assuring us that we could do it, too. My sister, yes, but me - not so much. No, at the time, my true artistry was confined to the Winkie Dink and Me show. I had my official Winkie Dink Magic Screen that I put over the top of the television screen as soon as the show began. Each week I would sit with anticipation, awaiting instructions from Winkie Dink on what I had to draw on the Magic Screen that would help him out of a jam. I remember one time, Winkie Dink asked all the kids, "Draw a rope to help me climb up this cliff?" Happy to comply, I got out my crayons and drew a rope, just as Winkie Dink instructed. You guessed it! I forgot to put the Magic Screen over the tv screen, and the wax crayon melted into the warm picture tube. I think the neighbors down the street heard my mother yelling that day. Mom had a great string of rants that she often turned to for these occasions; "Wait 'til your father sees this!" "I hope you like your room because that's the only place you'll be for the next two weeks!" And the ever popular, "This is why we can NEVER have anything nice!" Although Winkie Dink was banned and never to be seen on our television again, the crayon line in the middle of the screen was visible for months.

Creating art was something our entire family enjoyed. I'm not saying it was good – just that we enjoyed doing it. There was a brief time when my dad took up painting 'his version' of Japanese art. He 'claim to fame' was a picture he painted and titled *Birds in a Bare Tree*, with a distant snowcapped mountain. Dad painted that same picture of those same Japanese birds in a tree in different colors, and in different size frames and hung them up in every single room of the house ... AND we had Colonial-American furniture! It was no surprise that over time, mom methodically removed most of dad's Japanese art from the walls.

As I got older, I went through several art phases. Painting ceramic pieces became popular and in 1982, I painted Christmas Carolers that resembled family members. They were like Christmas voodoo dolls. Hee-hee! That was also the year I made the Ceramic Christmas Tree with my mom and sister. I'm sure many of you have one just like it ... in your attic. Still in the ceramic-mode, the following Spring mom and I made a life-size family of ducks and every year, to this day, I place the three I have left strategically on my front lawn, so I can see them from my front window.

Always on the hunt for a new craft project, my best friend Lynda and I, (I have a multitude of Linda/Lyndas in my life) signed up for a class at the Adult School for a Donna Dewberry's art course. Oh, we went all out – spared no expense! We bought her brushes, her paints, her brush holder, and her DVD. We learned her technique on how to paint beautiful flowers and leaves and we painted them on pillow cases, towels, napkins, aprons, placemats, and on way too much other stuff. Shortly thereafter, we ditched Donna and went on to drop another small fortune on scrap booking supplies. (I think we kept the economy going via art supplies.)

Years later, with our move to SRPN, I was given the good fortune to be the Editor of the community's Newsletter and Website, and the computer became my canvas. I suddenly found myself creating colorful flyers, editing photos and reports, and writing short stories. I guess *creating art* has followed me throughout my life in one form or another and I'm blessed for it. Whenever someone tells me, "I just loved your stories" it's like getting a hug. Thank you for letting me know you enjoy them. And to those who have told me "I read your last story. Poor Eddie!" - I'm happy to report that my brother survived his childhood with his two older sisters and is happily living out his retirement here in New Jersey and occasionally sends me a text: *Good story*, and I'll take that as a hug.

IMPORTANT for all Residents: Snow Ordinance and Rules

Winter will undoubtably come upon us again and sooner than most of us care to think about. Your Trustees want you to be informed, as a Silver Ridge Park North and Berkeley Township resident, of your responsibilities when it snows.

Silver Ridge Park North Community Clubhouse Rules

- 1. When there is snow in the Clubhouse parking lot, no vehicles will be allowed to park there until the plows have completely cleared the lot.
- 2. When the Clubhouse parking lot is closed, due to snow not having been plowed, the Clubhouse will also be closed.

Berkeley Township Ordinance No. 04-30-OAB § 7-8.3

7-8.3 Temporary Parking Prohibited for Snow Plowing and Removal.

a. Whenever snow has fallen and the accumulation is such that it covers the streets and highways, an emergency shall exist, and no vehicle shall be parked on the streets or highways, or portions thereof indicated.

The parking prohibitions listed below (e) shall remain in effect after the snow has ceased, until the streets have been plowed sufficiently and to the extent that parking will not interfere with the normal flow of traffic.

- b. Any unoccupied vehicle parked or standing in violation shall be deemed a nuisance and a menace to the safe and proper regulation of traffic and any Police Officer may provide for the removal of such vehicle. The owner shall pay the reasonable costs of the removal and storage, which may result from such removal before regaining possession of the vehicle.
- c. The effectiveness of this subsection is contingent upon signs being erected as required by law.
- d. Unless another penalty is expressly provided by New Jersey Statute, every person convicted of a violation of this subsection or any supplement thereto, shall be liable to a penalty of not more than fifty (\$50.00) dollars or imprisonment for a term not exceeding fifteen (15) days or both.
- e. Streets and Roadways Involved.
 - 1. All streets and roadways in the Township of Berkeley, except for State Highways.



Sudoku requires no calculation or arithmetic skills. It is essentially a game of placing numbers in squares, using very simple rules of logic and deduction.

The objective of the game is to fill all the blank squares in a game with the correct numbers. There are three very simple constraints to follow. In a 9 by 9 square Sudoku game:

- Every row of 9 numbers must include all digits 1 through 9 in any order
- Every column of 9 numbers must include all digits 1 through 9 in any order
- Every 3 by 3 subsection of the 9 by 9 square must include all digits 1 through 9

Every Sudoku games begins with a number of squares already filled in, and the difficulty of each game is largely a function of how many squares are filled in. The more squares that are known, the easier it is to figure out which numbers go in the open squares. As you fill in squares correctly, options for the remaining squares are narrowed and it becomes easier to fill them in.



Oh, Deer!

"We have become frighteningly effective at altering nature."-Sylvia Earle

When I first moved to Silver Ridge Park North, I enjoyed spotting the <u>occasional</u> deer behind my house, eating the vegetation as it strolled through the common grounds. They truly are such graceful animals, and it was relaxing to watch this beautiful wild animal forage for its meal throughout the community's common grounds. That was in 2011. Flash forward to 2024 and it's no longer the "occasional deer sighting" in the Common Grounds. Now there are herds of 10+ deer hoofing it down the street, sitting on lawns (and leaving their 'deposits' on the lawns), and dodging in front of cars. <u>Deer do NOT need human assistance for survival</u>. The Division of Fish and Wildlife through the Department of Environmental Protections <u>strongly advises against the feeding of deer</u>, and here's why:

- Feeding increases reproduction potential; higher nutrition levels, larger litters, and more litters each season. The deer have survived for years without your handouts Stop feeding them!
- Deer loses their fear of humans, and this is dangerous. They can inflict serious physical harm to humans from their hooves and/or antlers. If you're walking, they don't run away like they used to. How long before they become aggressive - stopping us from enjoying a simple walk around the community? Stop feeding them!
- Feeding enhances the spread of disease and parasites and may compromise the health of nontargeted species. FYI-New Jersey is number 1 in the nation for Lyme's Disease cases due to the extensive deer population. Stop feeding them!
- Deer eat plants, trees, shrubs, and bushes in surrounding properties, killing them, and costing hundreds, or thousands, of dollars for the resident to replace what was destroyed. Stop feeding them!
- The increase in the deer population has caused environmental change in our Common Grounds in a relatively short amount of time. We are losing plant life, insects and smaller animals that depend on the Common Grounds as their home. If you think feeding them will stop them from eating plants and shrubs, you're sadly mistaken. Deer stays where the food is plentiful. Stop feeding them!
- Feeding may cause deer to cross roadways they normally would not, increasing the potential for deer-vehicle collisions. These collisions cost thousands of dollars in vehicle damages. And some collisions cost the drivers and/or passengers their lives. Stop feeding them!

Deer have symbiotic microorganisms in their digestive system which enables them to break down cellulose found in plant matter. Feeding them fruit, corn or other non-plant matter can cause bloating, diarrhea, enteritis (stomach inflammation) and in some cases, death.

If you still aren't convinced, even with all the facts given in this article, let me appeal to your financial well-being; there is a \$250 fine for EACH offense, courtesy of Berkeley Township, if you are caught feeding wildlife.

So, if the deer show up at YOUR house again today because you have been feeding them, PLEASE make yesterday the last day you fed them. <u>Deer are NOT your pets</u>! Deer will continue to thrive as nature intended, just as they have for years, if you ALL leave them alone and <u>stop feeding them!</u>

Silver Ridge Park North Shed Rules

After discussion regarding sheds at the Silver Ridge Park North (SRPN) Trustee meeting, held on Tuesday, April 7, 2015, the Trustees unanimously agreed to Rules 1-8. Updated Permit/Form information - February 2019.

- 1. In keeping with Berkeley Township's Shed Ordinance, homeowners are permitted, effective this date, to install one (1) shed on their property; up to and including 120 square feet (10 ft. x 12 ft.);
- 2. Said shed may be of any structure material the homeowner desires;
- 3. Sheds that are required to be fastened must be on a firm ground structure. DO NOT place any shed on a cement slab. Cement slabs add square feet to your taxable living space and will be taxable by Berkeley Township;

- 4. Sheds may NOT be installed on any Common Ground Property;
- 5. In accordance with Berkeley Township Ordinance, sheds must be placed at least three (3) feet from the back property line and at least (3) feet from the side property line;
- 6. If a homeowner chooses to install a shed adjacent to their home, it may NOT block any windows or doors;
- 7. Homeowners MUST submit an Architectural Approval Request form to the SRPN Architectural Committee. *Architectural Approval Request forms are available in the SRPN Clubhouse Lobby;*
- 8. The homeowner MUST submit a **Zoning Permit Application**, required fees, and forms to the Berkeley Township Town Hall/Zoning Office. *Zoning Permit Application forms can be obtained from the Berkeley Township Website or Zoning Office.*

OCEAN RIDE ~ Reserve-A-Ride Program Ocean County Transportation Services Department

Seniors (age 60 and over) and/or persons with disabilities (age 18 and over) on an advanced reservation basis primarily to destinations within Ocean County. **Pre-registration is NOT required, just call us when you need your appointment.**

You may call Ocean Ride Monday through Friday only, from 8:00 AM to 4:30 PM to make your trip reservation. <u>We accept trip reservations on a first-come, first serve basis, up to (4) four weeks</u> in advance. All trip requests are to be handled by telephone by calling (732) 736-8989, then press "1" to speak with a Reservationist.

The Reserve-A-Ride program is primarily designed to serve routine medical needs of Ocean County residents. Unlike the Fixed Bus Routes, this service does not operate on the basis of a printed schedule, rather routes and pick-up times are developed each day in response to the service requests we receive. All vehicles are wheelchair lift equipped.

Once your reservation has been made, the driver will arrive anytime within 1 hour to 1½ hours of the scheduled appointment time (depending on your travel distance). In accordance with Ocean Ride's Safety Policy, our Drivers are NOT permitted to enter your home, thus we require that you be at ground level for your scheduled pick up.

Riders will be billed via mail, the month AFTER service. Absolutely NO CASH HANDLING on-board the Reserve-A-Ride vehicles.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION S R P NORTH HOMEOWNERS **ARCHITECTURAL COMMITTEE**

Prior to obtaining a permit from the Berkeley Township Construction Office and/or Zoning Office, homeowners must obtain a "Architectural Approval Request " form from the Architectural Committee. Sheds, upgrades, renovations, repairs, additions, exterior changes, anything pertain to the grounds, trees, driveway construction and sidewalks all require approval from the Architectural Committee. Note: Homeowners may need to submit a Zoning Permit Application, required fees, and forms to the Berkeley Township Town Hall/Zoning Office. Contact the Zoning Office for instructions.

COMMON GROUNDS

No debris, grass cuttings, landscape material, leaves, old plants, tree branches should be dumped in the common grounds. **Violators are subject to Berkeley Township fines.**

LAWS GOVERNING S R P NORTH

Mandatory Federal, NJ State, Berkeley Township Laws, SRPN Association Covenant-Restrictions and By-Laws and Robert Rules are instruments of the rule of law that the sitting Board of Trustees must follow to meet their obligations.

- Title VIII of the Civil Rights Act of 1968 (Federal Fair Housing Act)
- The Housing for Older Persons Act (HOPA)
- NJ State Public Law #L90-284 and PUB 100L430 Guidelines for the operation of senior communities.
- Berkeley Township Ordinance #118-1625. The establishment of a planned residential community for older adults.

 Silver Ridge Park North's Covenants and Restrictions/By-Laws.
- State of New Jersey Full Disclosure Act and Regulations Title #5.

SELLING/RENTING OF HOMES

When selling your home, either on your own or through a Real Estate Agent, you must notify the HOA **BEFORE** your buyer completes the 'New Purchaser's Packet' and provide the HOA with two (2) forms of identification; one being a photo ID showing birthdates for <u>each</u> <u>occupant</u> of the home. (See pg.2 for appt. information)

SRPN By-Laws require one (1) year homeowner's ownership prior to renting their property.

Landlords AND Tenants must complete the HOA's 'Lease Agreement Packet' and provide the HOA with two (2) forms of identification; one being a photo I.D. showing birthdates for **each occupant** <u>and</u> a copy of the Lease.

All buyers and tenants (all residents) **must appear** <u>in</u> <u>person</u> at the HOA office with the required identification and paperwork. Berkeley Township will not issue a C.O. (Certificate of Occupancy) without the HOA's Letter stating the buyer/tenants are in good standing with the Homeowners Association.

SIDEWALKS

It is each homeowner's responsibility to repair and maintain sidewalks on their property. All lifted and cracked sidewalks require repair at the homeowner's expense.

TREES

It is the homeowner's responsibility to prune and maintain trees located on their property. Also, **no tree in the common ground, or wildlife corridor, may be pruned, removed, or topped for any purpose, including installation of solar panels.** Trees in these areas needing attention should be brought to the attention of the *Common Ground Trees Committee.*

OTHER IMPORTANT REMINDERS

- Parking/storage of inoperable, unregistered, or uninsured motor vehicles, boats, or any other watercrafts, trailers, and/or recreational vehicles are not allowed anywhere on your property or Common Grounds.
- Berkeley Township Ordinance: Trash/garbage is to be put out at the curb <u>AFTER 4:00pm</u> on the day before a scheduled pickup. RECYCLED ITEMS are to be placed curbside, in reusable containers or <u>paper</u> bags, <u>AFTER 5:00pm</u> on the day before a scheduled pick up.
- <u>All pets are required to be leashed. You must</u> pick up and remove your pet's waste, even if you walk them in the common ground area.
- It is the Homeowner's responsibility to maintain their grass and/or stone lawns.
- <u>A Berkeley Township Ordinance strictly</u> prohibits the feeding of wild animals consisting of, but not limiting to, the following: DEER, rabbits, squirrels, chipmunks, and groundhogs. Wild birds are excluded.
